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


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Our Mission

In 2023, the Concho Valley Workforce Development Board proudly announced the appointment of Rynda Wortham as the Deputy Executive Director. Her impressive 15 years within the Workforce Family have equipped her with a deep understanding of the challenges faced by both job seekers and employers in the Concho Valley. Rynda's journey started as a dedicated case worker at the Workforce Solutions building. Through unwavering commitment and a passion for community service, Rynda rose through the



ranks, embodying the organization's values. As she steps into this new role, Rynda brings a commitment to fostering collaboration, innovation, and inclusivity within the workforce development landscape. Her promotion to Deputy Executive Director marks a significant milestone, and we eagerly anticipate witnessing her continued success.

Child Care Services

The Child Care Services program child care quality and enhances the availability improves and affordability for low-to-moderate income parents. CCS promotes longself-sufficiency by enabling term parents to work, seek employment, or attend workforce training or education activities. It also educates parents about the availability of quality child care, which improves children's early learning.

Eligible families of children under 13 may receive a child care scholarship so that parents work. seek can attend school. employment. or participate in training. Parents also pay a share of cost based on family income, family size and the number of children in care. Eligible families may choose from licensed child care centers. licensed or registered child care homes, or relative providers.

CCS also assists parents that are receiving services through other Workforce programs such as Choices, SNAP E&T, and WIOA. The program also works in partnership with the Department of Family and Protective Services (DFPS) to enroll children in child care as necessary. **Children Served** (Based on Monthly Average)





In addition to offering child care scholarships, Child Care Services partners with regulated child care providers to improve the quality of child care through the TEXAS RISING STAR (TRS) program. TRS Mentors work with child care providers to become certified TRS providers at either a 2-Star, 3-Star, or 4-Star level (4-Star being the highest level). In the Concho Valley, we have 8 TRS providers.

Along with the mentoring services, provides training/professional CCS development opportunities and items such as comprehensive curriculum and training on how to use this curriculum. CCS also helps provide indoor or outdoor equipment that will assist the provider and improve the quality of care at their child care center home. CCS is committed or to facilitating the process of obtaining and maintaining TRS certifications for regulated child care providers who have an agreement with CCS to enroll eligible children.

WIOA Programs Workforce Innovation & Opportunity Act

ADULT & DISLOCATED WORKER

The WIOA Adult and Dislocated Worker Program assists individuals with securing employment, education, training, and support services necessary to succeed in the workforce while matching employers with the skilled workers they need. WIOA customers can earn certifications, licenses, college credit, and work experience as well as find assistance with resume writing and tailored job searches. Our program exists to help people in the Concho Valley to provide for themselves and their families.

The WIOA Youth Program serves a variety of eligible job seekers, including 14-21 year-olds who are in school and 16-24 year-olds who are out of school. This program allows us to provide job skills for our future job seekers through paid work experience, work readiness courses, and tuition assistance for school. These initiatives focus on those with barriers to employment.

Career Exploration

The primary goal of the Career Exploration Program is to educate students on their career options and the potential paths to achieve their career goals. This year, we've expanded our education tools and began utilizing virtual reality. allowing students to gain first-hand the physical insight into industries requirements of the they're interested in.


In 2023, we attended successful events targeted toward students looking to explore their career options. These include the Career Signing Day, hosted by San Angelo ISD and the San Angelo Chamber of Commerce, and the Y-Texas Summit in Arlington, which attracted hundreds of students from across the state.

Client Success

WIOA Adult

This client applied for the WIOA Adult Program in hopes of obtaining his Class A CDL License and gaining fulltime employment as a heavy tractortrailer truck driver. During his time in the program, he remained focused on achieving his goals. Before enrolling in the WIOA Adult Program, he had been in prison and was determined to never be in that situation again, which is why he was so earnest in changing his life. Not only was he in the WIOA Adult Program through Workforce Solutions of the Concho Valley, but he also began participating in a program through a non-profit organization called the Concho Valley Turning Point (CVTP). The CVTP is dedicated to helping formerly incarcerated individuals recover from their past and move forward in their life. His hard work and dedication led him to be a success in the WIOA Adult Program as he obtained his Class A CDL License and is now employed full-time with Original Services. Inc. where he has the potential to earn up to \$450.00 per day.





WIOA Youth

When this young man came to Workforce Solutions of the Concho Valley, he was unsure if he would be able to gain the skills needed to be selfsufficient after high school. He enrolled in the WIOA Youth program which provided him with mentoring and training that allowed him to build both confidence and skills. He was nothing less than driven to achieve his goals throughout his time with the WIOA Youth Program and was an exemplary participant from the moment he began. His determination to be successful is what led the program to place him in a work experience with Big Rig Mechanic Shop, where he was trained in heavy equipment operation. During his work experience. he received perfect evaluations from his supervisor, and as a result of his tenacity, he gained fulltime employment with Big Rig Machine Shop. He is now well on his way to being self-sufficient.

Choices Programs

Temporary Assistance for Needy Families Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program Employment & Training



The Choices department consists of two programs that work hand-in-hand to financially assist job seekers while they transition from welfare programs to work. Our SNAP program strives to meet our clients where they are. Our Talent Development Specialists make strong bonds with clients while they identify skills, interests, and barriers. It is our goal to not only provide job matches and support services, but to help our customers be self-sufficient through gainful employment. Similarly, the TANF program assists recipients, non-recipient parents, and former recipients of TANF cash assistance through participation in work-related activities including job search and job readiness classes, basic skills training, education, vocational training, and support services.

Client Success

This client came to Workforce Solutions of the Concho Valley because he was on public assistance, and as a condition of receiving these State benefits, he had to participate in the Choices Program. He was very forthcoming regarding his past and current situation. He had recently been released from prison and was wearing an ankle monitor. Obtaining employment posed a significant challenge for him due to his criminal record. His main concern was that potential employers might be hesitant to offer him a second chance. His case manager ensured him that Workforce Solutions of the Concho Valley was here to help him gain employment. The case manager explained he may be eligible for fidelity bonding, which may make employers feels more comfortable hiring him. Fidelitv bonding is a free insurance policy that protects businesses from losses due to

employee dishonesty. This insurance allows employers to hire applicants that could be considered "at risk" due to their background. He was also provided our second chance employers list, a list of local employers that hire candidates that other companies may not consider. He began job searching and, through career planning and assessments, discovered he was interested in continuing his education. He was referred to the WIOA program to explore his education opportunities.

Together the two programs worked with the client to obtain all the information needed to begin classes at Howard College to become a certified maintenance technician. Through job search efforts he was hired by the City of San Angelo. He now balances his time between the Streets and Bridges Department and his studies.



further their career can success. In Texas. 3.2% of veterans are unemployed as of June 2023 (Texas Workforce Commission, Labor Market Information Department). The TVC team works to lower that number and serve our vets with the same dedication and lovalty as the men and women serving the nation. 


