Organize for a New School Year

With summer winding down, it's time to start thinking about the new school year. The beginning of a new school year is the perfect time to update and organize your child care space. To help you get started, here are a few suggestions:

- Over-the-door clear shoe organizers make great storage devices. You would be amazed at how much you can fit into those pockets. They conveniently hang on the back of a closet door, and you can see exactly what is stored inside.
- Stand-alone containers with clear drawers are the answer to finding what you need easily. Things get lost in file cabinets, but with see-through drawers you won't have to dig through file cabinets searching for or putting away things. Everything associated with learning units can go into the drawers. Small containers can be stacked to save space.
- Plastic shoe boxes and magazine holders create fool-proof storage spaces that you can maintain with almost no effort. Clear plastic shoe boxes are good for storing things so you can see what is inside at a glance.
- **Binders** are great for storing important paperwork in one place. Binders can house several sections, including:
 - calendars
 - year-at-a-glance
 - schedules
 - lesson plans
 - contact information
 - meeting notes
- Label all of your storage containers with the items inside using removable labels. As you get new items, you might consider throwing out some of the older things in your collection that you no longer use.
- Chronology is an important element for organizing materials. Organize and rotate your learning units in the order you plan to teach them throughout the year so they will be in order for the next year.

Keep your end goal in mind and work on refining your process. Some of the best ways to stay organized are to keep everything in one place, have a system that you can stick to, and take time to reflect and make notes as you go along. Staying organized will help you stay focused and allow you to create great lessons while keeping instruction moving ahead. Once you are organized, you will feel so good!
