#### **Make the Most of Teachable Moments**

Teachable moments occur spontaneously and usually happen when you least expect them. As a teacher, you have to be paying attention and be prepared to find ways to make use of them. The key to teachable moments is to seize the opportunity and be flexible, even if it sidetracks your lesson plans. Children are curious by nature and sometimes an innocent question can become an opportunity for everyone to explore and learn about a topic you hadn't planned to teach. What can you do to make sure your interactions, atmosphere, and learning activities provide teachable moments?

- Slow down, wait, and watch what the children are doing – Be in the moment
- Take note of what children are interested in and what they are able to do
- Ask questions or wonder, -- "I wonder what will happen when you push that button."
- Use full sentences with descriptive language to help children develop new understandings -describe using color, shape, sound, size, letters,

- Promote critical thinking -- help children sort out the facts to find answers to questions they ask
- Use simple explanations to help children understand why things happen or to evaluate a choice they've made —"What do you think will happen when you run down the slide?" or "I'm afraid you will hurt yourself if you run down the slide."

Unplanned opportunities for teachable moments often turn into some of the most impressionable times in your young student's educational journey. Skilled teachers understand teachable moments are a fleeting opportunity and must be seized when the chance arises. Encourage children in your care to ask questions to help them better understand topics and concepts, even if it's not what you planned to teach that day.
